

A Brief COVID update

Individuals make up a church, yet “a church” doesn't exist until those individuals come together, right? Similarly, individuals get sick, yet ‘public health’ impacts all of us. Where, how, and in what numbers individuals come together are important factors in the spread of disease and in maintaining public health. The intersection of “church” and “public health” can be a crucial one for a community. In addition, I have observed less reporting on the pandemic recently, probably because we would like it to be over and we have habituated to it. That does not make it go away. In those regards, we will continue to highlight information about COVID-19 and its variants.

Internationally: The Omicron Variant is now the leading cause of COVID-19 infections, hospitalizations, and deaths world wide. We now know that is the most contagious variant to date; it spreads quickly and easily. It appears to be less deadly, however, more children are becoming infected than with previous variants. The rise in cases that began around the middle of October has continued, becoming precipitous over the last few days. On December 27 the 7-day average of new cases was 859,443; on January 2 it was 1,448,761.

In the United States: On Decemberr27 the 7-day average of new cases was 239,100; on January 2 it was 413,207.

In Iowa: The last peak was Dec. 9, when the 7-day average of new cases was 1,768. On Jan. 2 it was 1,649.

In Jasper County: On November 25 the 7-day average of new cases was 17, On December 29 it was 21, and on December 31 (the last day for which records are currently available) the 7-day average of new cases was 19.

The most effective steps individuals can take to reduce the spread of the COVID-19 virus is to keep a physical distance of at least 6 feet from others; wear a well-fitting mask; open windows to improve ventilation; avoid poorly ventilated or crowded spaces; keep hands clean; cough or sneeze into a bent elbow or tissue; and get both vaccinations, plus the booster.

EDUCATION

The Book Study's exciting new selection is *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents* by Isabel Wilkerson. The following description is from the flap of the book. As you can imagine, the flap is written to put the book in as bright a light as possible. I (Open Door editor) have read this book. I endorse every word of this quote:

“In this brilliant book, Isabel Wilkerson gives us a masterful portrait of an unseen phenomenon in America as she explores, through an immersive, deeply researched narrative and stories about real people, how America today and throughout its history has been shaped by a hidden caste system, a rigid hierarchy of human rankings. . . . Beautifully written, original, and revealing, *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents* is an eye-opening story of people and history, and a reexamination of what lies under the surface of American life today.”

This is a meaty text of 385 pages. It is planned for 14 weeks, with weekly readings being 35 pages or less. We will begin on January 13 and end on April 14, just before Easter. This plan, of course, can change at any time, based on how the participants experience the material and what pace they prefer to pursue.

Communications

Church Council Catch Up

To keep the congregation informed about matters that impact our life together, we share notes from Church Council meetings here in the newsletter. Notes from the December 2021 Council meeting were not available when this newsletter went to press. The following updates are from the written reports on property maintenance and finances that were submitted electronically prior to the meeting, by Norm Van Klompenburg and Larry Leitner.

Property maintenance: Thanks to all who helped decorate the Church Building and grounds for the Christmas Season!

Preparations for winter are well underway:

- * Furnace filters have been changed.
- * Furnace condensate traps have been drained and cleaned
- * North gutter has been repaired
- * Main building NW roof shingle damage has been patched.
- * Thermostat temperature settings are being monitored.
- * Furnace operation is being monitored

If you notice other issues that need attention please notify Norm.

Thanks to all who have helped in getting all of this important work completed. We still need volunteers for several interior patch projects. If you are able to assist in completing any maintenance work, please let Norm know.

Finances: We had a good month in terms of income in November. In terms of expenses, we continue to spend substantially less on Pastoral expenses than budgeted (almost \$3,000 under budget) while we spend a bit more on our organist (about \$100 over budget), because we did not budget for Meditations and Music. We also came out about \$400 under budget for Maintenance costs, despite the fact that our building insurance rose more than we anticipated. I am, by the way, continuing to monitor our utilities to see if the increase built into the 2022 budget actually seems like it will be enough.

Turning to the year-to-date figures, our income looks good thus far. If you take the pledge income we have received during the 2021 calendar year and add the 2021 prepaid pledges, we stand, as of the end of November, with \$81,878.97 in pledge income. We budgeted \$82,615 for the year. Thus, we enter December needing less than \$750 to meet our budget projections for pledged income. I can confidently say that we will make that projection as I have a check given to me on December 2 that will more than put us over the top.

Our current Telephone and Internet expenses are about \$20 over what we budgeted for each month. About half of the overage comes from our Zoom subscription of \$10/month. We used Zoom extensively while we were shut down for the pandemic; currently we use it rarely, primarily for two participants in the Thursday evening book club. These individuals are not doing the current book. Whether they re-join for future books is unclear. Neither of them is a member of the church. We could consider the Zoom expense an Outreach. Alternatively, we could say it has served its purpose and we should quit paying for it. What is Council's pleasure? [Note: Council decided to discontinue the Zoom account.]
