### Fuller Scholarship Recipients: Spring 2019 Awards

Eve Fuller fulfilled the wishes of her husband, Max, and her own by leaving the bulk of their estate to our church to establish scholarships for children of members who were working toward a four-year degree. Our congregation recently updated the standards for these scholarships while seeking to stay true to the Fullers' intent in establishing the scholarship fund.

The purpose of these scholarships is to provide post-secondary education scholarships (for both full-time and part-time enrollment), and scholarships are awarded by priority based on the student's intent to complete a post-secondary degree according to the following (listed in priority order): Baccalaureate/Bachelor's Degree; Associate Degrees; Certificate program, Diploma program, Trades program; and Advanced Degrees. Additionally, in order to be eligible to receive a Fuller Scholarship, the applicant, and/or a parent or grandparent of the applicant must be a member of the Congregational United Church of Christ, in Newton, Iowa (at the time of the application).

Since the inception of awarding these scholarships in 1996, a total of \$180,500 has been awarded. The next scholarship application deadline is December 1<sup>st</sup>.

The 10 scholarship recipients for the 2019-2020 school year are as follows:

**Cutter Bence** is the son of Shawn and Sheila Bence and grandson of Les and Teresa Morgan. He graduated from Newton Senior High School in May 2019. Cutter plans to attend DMACC Ankeny to earn his AAS in Animation and Rich Media. He expects to graduate in May 2021 and then would like to work for a production company. He also wants to start a family and support them throughout his life.

**Alexis Borgestad** is the daughter of Cameron and Jill McGinley and granddaughter of Bonnie and the late Steven McGinley. She graduated from the University of Northern Iowa in December 2016 with her Bachelor of Arts in Biology Honors Research, Chemistry minor, and Global Health Certificate. She is currently enrolled in the University of Iowa College of Dentistry and anticipates graduating with her Doctor of Dental Surgery degree in May 2021. Alexis's goal is to become a practicing dentist, and she might want to become a specialty dentist. After being immersed more fully in the dental world, she sees how saving teeth, or saving our teeth as we get older can really have a large impact on our quality of life and has

begun to have a heavy focus on preventative measures as well as making saving key teeth a priority. There are numerous amazing programs she looks forward to being a part of when she has her DDS that include school intervention programs as well as nursing home prevention days. She is also interested in tooth saving measures such as root canals. Alexis has found that quality of life in regards to our teeth has a larger impact that one would expect, and she wants to work to change the narrative and the understanding of what a patient's options are when it comes to saving teeth and replacing them.

She graduated from Oskaloosa High School in 2016 and is currently attending Central College working toward a Bachelor's Degree in Elementary Education with an anticipated graduation date of May 2020. She is also getting endorsements in reading and special education. Brooke's goal is to teach for a few years in a general education classroom and then work her way into a special education classroom. Her interest in teaching is spurred by a desire to foster a love for learning in kids and provide a welcoming environment to grow and be unique.

**Macy Caves** is the daughter of Kenny and Lora Caves and the granddaughter of David & Dorothy Raymond. She graduated from Newton High School in 2016. Macy is currently a junior at Grand View University and is enrolled in the nursing program. She expects to graduate with her RN/BSN in April 2020. She also has a psychology minor. Macy's goal is to work in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). She has a strong interest in working with children and is confident that is her vocation in life.

## Hymn Sing Sunday

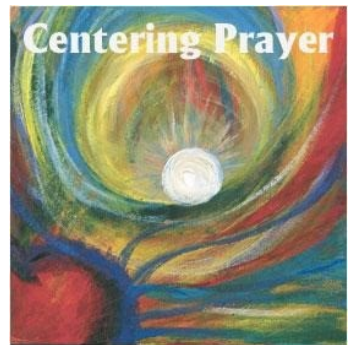

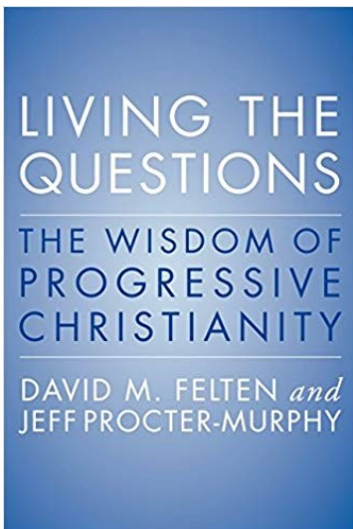
## “Living the Questions” Study

Participants should read the designated section of the book (approximately 20 pages) prior to our Thursday meeting and be prepared to discuss any thoughts, questions, and curiosities spurred by the weekly reading. 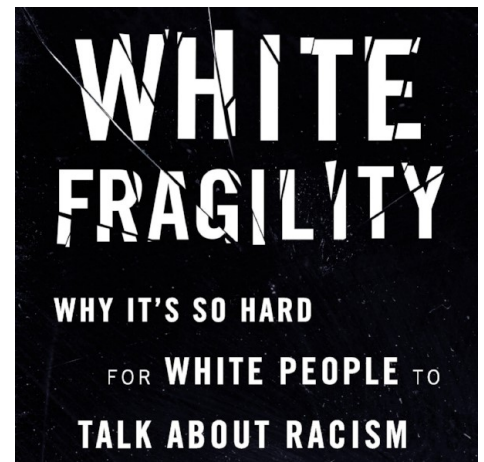
Following the conclusion of this study, our Thursday evening Bible study will take a break for the summer and reconvene for a new study in September.

# Communications

## Church Council Catch Up

In an effort to keep our congregation more informed regarding the various matters that impact our life together, notes from Church Council meetings are shared with our friends and members via this newsletter. Complete minutes of each Council meeting are available in the church office. Below please find highlights from the May 8<sup>th</sup> Council meeting.

- **Treasurer's report:** Our current checking account balance is \$7,804.65. We spent \$1,837.91 more than we took in for this month.
- **Maintenance report:** Our newly formed building and grounds committee is keeping a running list of project-ed tasks that will need volunteers for help. These tasks were reviewed.
- **Fuller Scholarships:** 10 scholarships were awarded for a total of \$19,500. Notification letters have been sent.
- **Matters of note:** The new projector and banner have arrived. We are still waiting for our ONA certificate.
- **Active Shooter Training:** Several members of Council visited with Wayne Winchell and walked through our building. It is recommended that Council do awareness training. Lieutenant Winchell is doing an assessment of our building in terms of vulnerability and will share his report for consideration by the Council.
- **PI Partnership:** All went well with the second-grade tours. It was decided to do it again next year. We clarified that it is a PI Project, not a UCC project. We still need changes in the proposed Letter of Agreement for possible regular building use, especially the time frame. We need to consider compensation for the building use and need clarifications on snow removal and other issues. PI will be contacted for refinement of the agreement to make it more specific.
- **Personnel Matters:** According to our bylaws, Council is our "chief administrative body." The Moderator is in effect the CEO. Staff job descriptions, salary, hiring/firing must be carefully followed. Council must take formal action on policies. Council will act on all job descriptions during next month's meeting.
- **Facing Our Financial Reality:**
  - ◇ Reviewing and updating our church profile (which is supposed to be a living document) will provide greater clarity on where we are going as a congregation. It is recommended we do such a review every three years. Council will receive a link for further study on this.
  - ◇ Sharing resources with another congregation—where are we? How do we get to the point where income and expenditures match? How long do we wait? The possibility of sharing resources (at minimum, sharing a pastor) will be discussed with the congregation during the Congregational Conversation on June 9. The small group to prepare for this conversation is April, Lin, Norm, and Jane Ann.
- **Outreach:** We will further investigate local events in which we might participate. Regarding inviting Pete Buttigieg, Rev. Petersen got a response from one of his Iowa organizers. There was opposition to the church sponsoring his possible visit to Newton because it might give the appearance that our congregation is endorsing him. Rev. Petersen will inform the organizer. We will reach out to other members to plan a back to school event.
- **Other:** Upcoming dates were reviewed. The Capitol City Pride Parade (June 9); we will not participate as a congregation due to Newton Fest and reunion weekend in Newton. Jamie noted very positive comments regarding our "all gender restroom" signs on Facebook from Robert Ramsey.
