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Pastor Petersen's Perspective: On Direct Communication

"If your sibling should commit some wrong against you, go and point out the error, but keep it between the two of you. If that one listens to you, you have won a loved one back; if not, try again, but take one or two others with you, so that every case may stand on the word of two or three witnesses. If your sibling refuses to listen to them, refer the matter to the church. If that one ignores even the church, then treat that sibling as you would a Gentile or a tax collector." — Matthew 18:15-17

Recently, I have been hearing a number of comments regarding my job performance from second-hand sources. A few members have come to me to voice others' thoughts about sermons, about childcare, about visitation. As these comments are shared, I regularly hear the phrase, "some people," as in "some people were upset with your sermon" or "some people have said they think Jabali should be in childcare." In the scripture quoted above, Jesus is shown advising his disciples to speak to one another directly when a problem arises. As David R. McMahill states it in his guidelines for healthy communication, "say what needs to be said to the one who needs to hear it" ("Completing the Circle," 2003).

In all relationships, people are bound to have differences and disagreements. The quality of a relationship is not determined by the number of disagreements but by how the involved parties handle those differences and work through those disagreements. In a healthy relationship, parties do not avoid disagreements; they resolve them while remaining respectful to each other, and in the process strengthen the relationship. I value the relationships I have with each of you individually and collectively and certainly strive to communicate with you in a direct, open, and honest manner at all times. I invite you to share with me (and one another and those with whom you are in relationship outside of the church) in such a way as well.

I realize that communicating with others in such a way requires the one raising the disagreement to be vulnerable as you are sharing your true thoughts, your deep feelings, and your essential self. I promise, and I hope you have come to know me well enough to trust, that I will never treat you negatively because you disagree with me on something. I will always treat you with dignity and respect. I

simply ask that you do the same by bringing matters of concern directly to me so that we can have a conversation, come to understand one another better, and move forward in strengthened relationship.

Direct, open, and honest communication also requires the one bringing forward the disagreement to trust the other to be able to manage their own emotions. You all are not responsible for making me feel happy, sad, content, upset, etc. I am the only one who can effectively manage my own emotions. I ask that you trust that I am attending to my own spiritual and psychological care.

The full suggested guidelines for healthy communication offered by McMahill (which are printed and posted on the wall in the Parish House conference room) are as follows:

- I tell my own story and let others tell theirs.
- I avoid "awfulizing" negative experiences.
- I say what needs to be said to the one who needs to hear it.
- I devote at least as much time to careful listening as I do to careful speaking.
- If something prompts anger in me, I report it honestly in a way that invites positive solutions.
- I refrain from blaming and shaming.

I invite you, friends, to consider these guidelines. Are there others you would add? Will you commit to communicating in line with these suggestions?

I look forward to our future communications with you all. May they be direct, may they be open, and may they be honest that we might for faithfully live together as this beloved community of God.

Lenten Prayer Partners

Praying for another and knowing someone is praying for you can have a powerful impact on one's life. Once again during the season of Lent (February 26th – April 11th), you are encouraged to begin a new prayer practice, namely to join with a partner in prayer.

How does this work?

You and your prayer partner talk on the phone or in person (no texting! no email!) once a week for fifteen minutes. You talk confidentially about things that really matter, and tell what you'd like your prayer

partner to pray for you that week. Then you actually pray together, if both of you are comfortable doing that, or you covenant to pray individually later for your partner.

UCC General Synod Resolutions



The General Synod of the United Church of Christ is the national decisionmaking body for the denomination, responsible for giving general direction to the evangelistic, missionary, and justice

programs of the UCC. Because the UCC holds to a covenantal polity, any decisions made by the Synod are not binding upon the UCC's congregations (or its associations or conferences) in any way, though the national offices and the UCC's Constitution and Bylaws expect serious consideration to be given them.


Twenty resolutions were approved by the delegates to the 32nd General Synod (June 21st-25th, 2019). You are encouraged to read each of these resolutions and listen to how God is speaking to our local congregation through this witness of the wider UCC.

Two binders, each including all 20 resolutions, are available in the church library. The resolutions may also be accessed online at ucceverywhere.org/synod. Additionally, throughout the upcoming months, one resolution will continue to be introduced during worship on the first Sunday of each month.

Lenten Sunday Study

During the season of Lent (February 26th-April 11th), you are encouraged to engage in a study of "Small on Purpose: Life in a Significant Church" by Lewis A. Parks. In his book, "Parks shows us how life in a small congregation is profoundly significant and the important role these churches play. This book includes clear instructions on how leaders can streamline ministry to maximize the unique and powerful contributions small churches make in their communities. <u>Iowa's Natural Resources</u> and Outdoor Recreation Trust Fund

On Sunday, February 23rd, 10:30am-11:30am, we will continue our series of monthly educational opportunities to address the great moral challenge of the ecological crisis.



During this session, State Representative Wes Breckenridge, representing Iowa House District 29 (elected in November 2016), will speak about Iowa's Natural Resources and Outdoor Recreation Trust Fund. In 2010, 63% of Iowans voted to create the Trust Fund, which is a permanent and protected funding source. However, the fund remains empty to this day because it requires a state sales tax increase of 3/8ths of a cent for funding. Breckenridge will share about what initiatives the Trust Fund is set up to provide and address its connections to the state house. A brief worship service will take place at 10:00am prior to the presentation.


Bible Study: The Gospel of Mark

Good Thing); March 19th—Mark 4 (Sowing Seeds of Confusion); March 26th—Mark 5 (Legions of Demons, Blood, Death, and Healing).


and life experiences. You'll be able to share your own wrestlings and thoughts while learning something new along the way.

Communications

Church Council Catch Up

In an effort to keep our congregation more informed regarding the various matters that impact our life together, notes from Church Council meetings are shared with our friends and members via this newsletter. Complete minutes of each Council meeting are available in the church office. Below please find highlights from the January 8th Council meeting submitted by Jennifer, Secretary.

- The meeting began with a welcoming of new members and a time of quiet prayer and reflection.
- Secretary's Report: Some small changes were necessary. Minutes were approved as corrected.
- Treasurer's Report: Expenses for 2019 were under budget. Non-pledge income for 2019 exceeded expectations, and we received 100.6% of monies pledged for the year. Our 2019 deficit was approximately \$26,800. Pledges for 2020 have exceeded our projections; as the budget stands, we will still have a deficit and need to draw from endowment funds. Due to some problems, it was agreed, by consensus, to stop paying bills online for the time being.
- Scholarship Committee: The remaining budgeted funds were \$5,500.00. Three applications were reviewed and the applicants were found to be well qualified. By consensus, the council agreed to add \$500.00 to the scholarship fund for a total of \$6,000.00. For the 2019-2020 year, a total of \$25,500.00 for 13 recipients will be distributed. In the future, we will have only one application deadline. April 1 will now be the deadline for all applicants.
- Maintenance Report: Thermostats have been adjusted and seem to be working. The West entrance doors also had adjustments to them; they appear to be affected by humidity. These doors may need work in the future.
- Scouting Committee Update: There has been no further communication with St. John UCC in Melbourne. Conversations have continued with Bethany UCC in Baxter, and it seems this would be a good fit. The Scouting Committee will meet with Rev. Darrell Goodwin and Bethany UCC members to create a plan to move forward. Jessica will send out an email to the committee as to the exact date of the meeting during the week of Jan. 20th. Bev Thomas will continue to be consulted regarding service times as conversations continue.
- **Membership:** A group will be convened to do phone calling to reach out to seldom-seen members. This led to a discussion of sermon content and declining attendance including what Rev. Petersen hopes to accomplish with sermons and worship and a conversation about congregational needs.
- Quarterly Potluck: Our quarterly Potluck will be held on February 16 following the service. It is "Bring a Friend to Church Sunday." The council agreed by consensus that we should provide table service (plates, glasses, flatware, etc.).
- O & A: DMACC said we could not distribute brochures through them due to the religious nature of the information. We discussed leaving a brochure on the bulletin board at the library with a post it note attached stating, "Take Me." This would require that the bulletin board be checked regularly and the brochure replaced. The brochures and bumper stickers will be available in the brochure rack and the pews in our church.
- Suicide Prevention Training: Will take place later in the spring.
- **Structure Bylaws Follow-up:** Will create a binder with instructions for various volunteer services to the church, i.e., communion set up, ushering, etc.
- **Upcoming Events:** Game Night on January 17, 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.; Congregational Conversation on February 9 will be an update on our plan to share our pastor with another church; due to expected inclement weather and resulting low attendance, it was agreed, by consensus, to postpone our next presentation on various religions previously scheduled for February and continue in March, April, and May.
- The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.



Fuller Scholarships

Eve Fuller fulfilled the wishes of her husband, Max, and her own by leaving the bulk of their estate to our church to establish scholarships for sons and daughters of members who were working toward a four-year degree. Our congregation recently updated the standards for these scholarships while seeking to stay true to the Fullers' intent in establishing the scholarship fund.

The purpose of these scholarships is to provide post-secondary education scholarships (for both full-time and part-time enrollment), and scholarships will be awarded by priority based on the student's intent to complete a post-secondary degree according to the following (listed in <u>priority order</u>): Baccalaureate/Bachelor's Degree; Associate Degrees; Certificate program, Diploma program, Trades program; and Advanced Degrees.

In order to be eligible to receive a Fuller Scholarship, the applicant, <u>and/or</u> a parent or grandparent of the applicant must be a member of the Congregational United Church of Christ, in Newton, Iowa (at the time of the application).

The amount of the scholarship will be determined by the Scholarship Committee based on which of the four types of education listed above the student intends to enroll and if enrolled full or part-time. Also, the information provided on the completed application form is a very important factor. Such information includes: the student's academic performance in high school, college, and/or other post-secondary education; their participation in school and community activities; their goals or aspirations; the student's participation in the life and work of our church; a parent's and/or grandparent's participation in the life and work of our church which includes attending worship and serving the church in a variety of ways.

Application forms will be provided for those students applying for the first time and for those asking for a renewal of their scholarship. Please contact the church office for an application. Applications follow a similar format as those used by the Dollars for Scholars Scholarships.

For all applicants, **applications are due April 1**st . Questions about how to complete the application form should be directed to the church office and a member of the Scholarship Committee will contact you with the requested information.

Following the application review by the Scholarship Committee, Newton High school graduates will be awarded their scholarship at the annual Senior Awards Assembly in May. All other applicants will receive a letter regarding the approval of their application and the amount of the scholarship by mail.

Once the scholarship is awarded, the student must submit an enrollment form from the post-secondary institution verifying their enrollment. This form will be provided for the applicant. The scholarship funds will be paid directly to the educational institution the student attends.

Since the inception of awarding these scholarships in 1996, a total of \$186,500 has been awarded. Through prudent investment of the monies received, this will be a continuing church program.
