A Look at the Texas-Mexico Border through the Lens of Faith: Take Action to Help Immigrants

On Sunday, December 22nd, Janet Cook offered us a thought-provoking and heart-wrenching look at the Texas-Mexico border. At the close of her remarks, she briefly shared ways that we can get help people seeking to immigrate to the United States through our southern border. These suggestions are shared below. Additionally, if you were not able to hear Janet's remarks in-person, you can watch her presentation on our Facebook page or request a printed copy of her remarks by contacting Rev. Petersen.

- Contact your senators and congressperson. Tell them regularly that the devastating Migrant "Protection" Protocol aka "Remain in Mexico" must stop.

- Learn what could be functional immigration policy, e.g., at www.migrantjusticeplatform.org.





UCC General Synod Resolutions

The General Synod of the United Church of Christ is the national decision-making body for the denomination, responsible for giving general direction to the evangelistic, missionary, and justice programs of the UCC. Because the UCC holds to a covenantal polity, any decisions made by the Synod are not binding upon the UCC's congregations (or its associ-

ations or conferences) in any way, though the national offices and the UCC's Constitution and Bylaws expect serious consideration to be given them.

The United Church of Christ's Thirty-Second General Synod was held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, June 21st-25th, 2019. The theme for the 32nd General Synod was based on the scripture Matthew 5:16: "In the same way let your light shine before others . . ." Twenty resolutions were approved by the delegates to the 32nd General Synod. You are encouraged to read each of these resolutions and listen to how God is speaking to our local congregation through this witness of the wider UCC.

Two binders, each including all 20 resolutions, are available in the church library. The resolutions may also be accessed online at ucceverywhere.org/synod. Additionally, throughout the upcoming months, we will explore one resolution during worship on the first Sunday of each month.




"Climate Church, Climate World" Study


perspectives, and life experiences. You'll be able to share your own wrestlings and thoughts while learning something new along the way.

Church Council Catch Up

In an effort to keep our congregation more informed regarding the various matters that impact our life together, notes from Church Council meetings are shared with our friends and members via this newsletter. Complete minutes of each Council meeting are available in the church office. Below please find highlights from the December 11th Council meeting submitted by Jamie Sawin, Secretary.

- **Opening devotions** included praying for church members; we have not prayed for our entire membership by name. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved.
- **Treasurer's Report:** We have \$78,470 in 2020 pledges so far, which is below projections. The fourth stewardship letter goes out early next week. It was decided by consensus to share the funds raised through the communion offering with members who are in serious financial need as determined by Pastor Jessica.
- Maintenance Report: There have been a couple of minor problems with thermostats and a smoke alarm that have been resolved.
- Scouting Committee Update: They have not met since the last Council meeting. Jessica met for a third time with Congregational UCC in Baxter; it was decided this would not be a good fit theologically. She met with Melbourne UCC's search committee last night; they have an interim right now and are not in a hurry to replace her; they will meet again in January. Jessica met with the full search committee at Bethany UCC in Baxter; they will meet again next Tuesday. Rev. Darrell Goodwin serves our Association and will meet with our scouting committee after the new year. The committee is working on a job description for a half-time pastor. It was suggested we consider going back to our committee structure.
- Spring Emergency Response Training: Will be held in March or April for church members.
- Building Use Request: Al-Anon withdrew their request.
- Blood Drive: This will be held January 25 from 9:00am to 1:00pm. Katy Fresh will lead this.
- Monthly Game Night: Families in the church who have children were consulted, and the 3rd Friday of the month was found to be a good date. Will begin January 17 from 6:00pm to 8:00pm. Snacks and popcorn will be available, and participants will bring their own games (non-electronic).
- **Open & Affirming:** We have received our certificate, and press releases have been submitted. Bumper stickers have been ordered, and we will add a rainbow to our church sign. We will consider hanging our banner outside in the spring. We will try to distribute our brochures at DMACC, the library, and other public locations. We will put them in the church brochure rack and our pews.
- Suicide Prevention Training: Will be held later in the spring.
- Visitation Plan: Will develop to connect with members we don't often see. We are unsure how to do this. Members have signed up for this need. Thanksgiving cards were sent to 15 members with health concerns and mobility issues that keep them from attending.
- Appreciation: Les Morgan, Jane Ann Cotton, and Jamie Sawin were thanked for their years of service to the church.
