We are a community of God's beloved dedicated to **following** the teachings of Jesus as we live our faith by **loving** and **serving** all of God's creation and **striving** for justice and peace throughout our community, our nation, and the world.

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Pastor Petersen's Perspective: On Public Confession

The season of Lent is here and calling us to repentance, confession, and penitence. It has taken me years to come to grips with talking about such things as they always seemed so negative to me. I wanted to focus on the good in humanity, the belovedness of humanity, the image-of-God-ness of humanity. But the truth is we are not only good; we human beings do some really awful things to one another, to ourselves, and to the rest of this creation with which we live. And, we do some not so awful but not particularly lovely things as well as refrain from doing life-giving, healing things to one another, ourselves, and to our fellow members of creation. The truth is we sin multiple times a day, each and every day.

That word "sin" was a hard one for me too. Sin seemed to be at the root of repentance, confession, and penitence. When I thought about sin, it became allconsuming; it meant that we humans were all bad, incapable of doing any good. But the truth is that we are neither all good nor all bad; the truth is that we are both. However, it seems to me that as we live our lives most of us seek to show others only the good; we put on masks, put on a show so that others won't see those things in us of which we are ashamed. We put our lives out there through a filter and shove what Carl Jung calls our "shadow side" (the secret, unexplored part of our personality where we put all the parts of ourselves that are ugly, shameful, monstrous) into the closet or the basement or wherever denying its very existence.

As you might have guessed, this is not a particularly healthy or helpful practice. Yet, it seems our fear of rejection, our fear of not being loveable, our fear of being ridiculed too often overrides us doing what would be good for us, healthy for us, life-giving for us. That is, it seems our fear encourages us to keep our shadows and our sins right there in the dark rather than to bring them out into the light where they can be seen full on and thus managed and transformed.

This Lent; this six-week season that calls us to repentance, confession, and penitence; this period in the Christian liturgical calendar that challenges us to look closely at our sins and where we have fallen short of God's best hopes for us, I want to try something. I want us to try doing this examination, this confession publicly. More specifically, I'd like to invite five of you to give a testimony during worship about a sin you committed, either recently or in the distant past. I am inviting five of you to share openly, honestly, vulnerably a more whole you. I'm inviting you to share for your own benefit as such an outing of that which has been hidden allows us to live more fully, more authentically, more integrated. I am inviting you to share for the benefit of the congregation, for when one shares their full self honestly and openly, showing their warts and all, they inspire the rest of us to do the same. I am inviting you to bring your stories before God and before God's people, to confess a sin with which you have found some resolution and peace and to share the grace of God which you experienced in that resolution. I am inviting you to share as what theologian Henri Nouwen calls a "wounded healer." And, for those of you who will not be standing at the microphone sharing in this way, I am inviting you to be open to hearing of these experiences, to see a side of your fellow members not before seen and to hold them in love.

To be fully honest with you, I am a bit terrified myself to go down this path because I know that I must do this public confessing myself (which is why I'm asking for five volunteers for six weeks). Indeed, I debated writing about something else this month trying to convince myself that we could do this at a later time, when I'm less busy, when the weather is better, etcetera. But God kept working on me and revealed that these reasons were simply rationalizations and excuses fueled by fear. Once again, I feel I am being called to back up my words with actions as I've wondered with you all before, if we cannot be our true, whole selves in the community of faith, then where can we be?

I was recently asked what I think the purpose of the church is. Though I am in full support and completely agree with the statement on the front of this newsletter, I responded that I believe the church is here to inspire, challenge, and support people to live more fully and completely as their authentic selves, which is as beloved children of God. It is my belief that offering an opportunity for such public confession will aid us in that endeavor. I pray that you will find this to be true as well.

Education

Education Series on Poverty

During our 2017 Annual Meeting, we affirmed God's call to focus on developing relationships with our neighbors directly impacted by poverty as we seek to live out our overall mission as a congregation. You are encouraged to continue learning about the state of poverty in our nation and to listen for ways we are being called to address this injustice as our six-month educational series on poverty continues (October-April, no meetings in January).

On Wednesday, March 6th, 6:00pm-7:30pm, you are encouraged to gather in the Sanctuary for our fifth video teach-in, entitled "The Right to Health and a Healthy Planet: Ecological Devastation and Health Care." This teach-in, along with all of the others in this series, consists of a panel speaking about poverty from various perspectives as part of this summer's 40-day launch of the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival. As this is Ash Wednesday, imposition of ashes will be offered at the close of our gathering time.

Then on **Sunday, March 17th, 9:00am-9:45am**, you are invited to gather in the **Parish House** to discuss a segment of "The Souls of Poor Folk: Auditing America 50 Years After the Poor People's Campaign Challenged Racism, Poverty, the War Economy/Militarism and Our National Morality" by the Institute for Policy Studies. Participants should read the following sections prior to our meeting: "War Economy and Militarism" (pages 68-88) and "Ecological Devastation" (pages 89-111).

Over the course of these six months, participants will read all of "The Souls of Poor Folk" audit, which is an assessment of these conditions today and trends of the past 50 years in the United States. It challenges us to take a look at how these conditions have changed since 1968, when the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., alongside a multiracial coalition of grassroots leaders, religious leaders, and other public figures, began organizing with poor and marginalized communities across racial and geographic divides to confront the underlying structures that perpetuated misery in their midst. The stark findings draw from a wide variety of sources, including primary and secondary data as well as interviews with and testimonies by people who have been living through and responding to these changes on the ground. Lenten Bible Study: "Entering the Passion of Jesus"





Church Council Catch Up

In an effort to keep our congregation more informed regarding the various matters that impact our life together, notes from Church Council meetings are being shared with our friends and members via this newsletter. Complete minutes of each Council meeting are available in the church office. Below please find highlights from the February 13th Council meeting.

- **Finances**: We have lost money on our investments. Our balance on hand is \$32,327.79.
- Maintenance report: The gutter problem may require taking bids from professionals for repair. We will
 drop the sanctuary thermostat to 55 degrees during the week and turn it back up to a maximum of 70
 degrees for Sundays and events.
- Suggestions offered during the **Financial Reality Conversation** of January 13th were reviewed in detail.
 - We will follow up on the options for **insurance on the building**. We must maintain liability insurance.
 - Selling our building is not a good option as it would be very hard to sell and may not yield any savings (due to the cost of renting or building a new space, utilities, insurance, etc.).
 - A new job description will be developed for the Administrative Assistant position, which is very important for our church growth. Rev. Petersen will discuss options with Barbara Vasquez regarding continuing her service.
 - Yoking with another church is an option that would require conversations over a long period of time.
 - **Renting our building** would have numerous financial implications such as property taxes.
 - We may consider applying for **grants**.
 - We will follow up on moving our "No matter who you are...you are welcome" sign to in front of the air conditioner unit on 3rd Avenue.
 - We will research **community events** (such as Farmer's Market and parades) for our possible participation that would increase our visibility in the community.
- Following the affirmation of our Open and Affirming Covenant, restroom signs will be changed to "Restroom." Craig Armstrong volunteered to draft a press release for sharing our ONA status with the public.
- Second grade tours for Progress Industries will be April 2nd & 9th. Sign-up sheets will be made available.
- A Building and Grounds Committee will soon be appointed.
- **Pub Theology** was fun! It will be changed to the 4th Monday of each month.

Fuller Scholarships

Eve Fuller fulfilled the wishes of her husband, Max, and her own by leaving the bulk of their estate to our church to establish scholarships for sons and daughters of members who were working toward a four-year degree. Our congregation recently updated the standards for these scholarships while seeking to stay true to the Fullers' intent in establishing the scholarship fund.

The purpose of these scholarships is to provide post-secondary education scholarships (for both full-time and part-time enrollment), and scholarships will be awarded by priority based on the student's intent to complete a post-secondary degree according to the following (listed in <u>priority order</u>): Baccalaureate/Bachelor's Degree; Associate Degrees; Certificate program, Diploma program, Trades program; and Advanced Degrees.

In order to be eligible to receive a Fuller Scholarship, the applicant, <u>and/or</u> a parent or grandparent of the applicant must be a member of the Congregational United Church of Christ, in Newton, Iowa (at the time of the application).

The amount of the scholarship will be determined by the Scholarship Committee based on which of the four types of education listed above the student intends to enroll and if enrolled full or part-time. Also, the information provided on the completed application form is a very important factor. Such information includes: the student's academic performance in high school, college, and/or other post-secondary education; their participation in school and community activities; their goals or aspirations; the student's participation in the life and work of our church; a parent's and/or grandparent's participation in the life and work of our church which includes attending worship and serving the church in a variety of ways.

Application forms will be provided for those students applying for the first time and for those asking for a renewal of their scholarship. Please contact the church office for an application. Applications follow a similar format as those used by the Dollars for Scholars Scholarships.

For all applicants, **applications are due April 1**st (for summer and fall enrollment) or December 1st (for winter and spring enrollment). Questions about how to complete the application form should be directed to the church office and a member of the Scholarship Committee will contact you with the requested information.

Following the application review by the Scholarship Committee, Newton High school graduates will be awarded their scholarship at the annual Senior Awards Assembly in May. All other applicants will receive a letter regarding the approval of their application and the amount of the scholarship by mail.

Once the scholarship is awarded, the student must submit an enrollment form from the post-secondary institution verifying their enrollment. This form will be provided for the applicant. The scholarship funds will be paid directly to the educational institution the student attends.

Since the inception of awarding these scholarships in 1996, a total of \$161,000 has been awarded. Through prudent investment of the monies received, this will be a continuing church program.
